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**Children Aided through Three Social Service Agencies:  
Outreach Concern  
Painted Turtle  
Para Los Ninos**

**November, 2013:** The William H. Hannon Foundation has provided grants to three social service agencies providing educational support for at-risk students as well as camping opportunities for children with severe disabilities. The agencies receiving grants during the third quarter were: Outreach Concern, Painted Turtle and Para Los Ninos. Additional grants totaling \$225,000 also were awarded during the third quarter to other social service, religious and academic institutions.

“These social service agencies represent the broad spectrum of organizations the William H. Hannon Foundation’s Board of Directors likes to support. Some of these organizations have longtime ties to our Foundation, going back to when my late uncle, William Hannon, was alive, but they also share in common a focus on helping young people excel either academically or socially,” said Kathleen Hannon Aikenhead, President of the William H. Hannon Foundation.

Outreach Concern is a non-profit school-based counseling agency founded in 1993. Over the past 20 years, the organization has provided a variety of counseling and pupil personnel services in over 250 elementary, middle and high schools throughout Southern California, serving over 500,000 children and families. Recently, Outreach Concern has provided services at 12 of the most economically disadvantaged Catholic schools in Los Angeles.

Painted Turtle provides a year-round, life-changing environment and authentic camp experience for children with chronic and life-threatening illnesses at its 173-acre camp and medical facility located in Lake Hughes, CA, just north of Los Angeles. Painted Turtle is a member of the SeriousFun Children’s Network of camps founded by actor Paul Newman, yet operates under its own charitable designation.

Para Los Ninos (PLN) is a nonprofit organization dedicated to the academic success and social well being of children. With six early education centers and three charter schools serving more than 1,600 children in Los Angeles, PLN places education at the core of its mission to break the cycle of poverty and close the achievement gap for students. PLN operates in some of the poorest areas of Los Angeles, including Skid Row as well as Pico Union and East and South Los Angeles. The organization is the only mental health provider in the Los Angeles Skid Row area.
