The William H. Hannon Foundation has announced a set of grants to six local Catholic high schools and organizations totaling \$225,000.

The William H. Foundation has provided grants to the following schools:

- Aquinas High School in San Bernardino
- Flintridge Sacred Heart Academy in La Cañada
- Mary Star of the Sea High School in San Pedro
- Marymount High School in Los Angeles
- St. Anthony High School in Long Beach
- Xavier College Preparatory in Palm Desert

The grants will help the schools in a variety of ways, including providing scholarships and tuition relief for students in need, offsetting the costs of infrastructure changes, and helping schools lower the cost of retreats for their students.

Additionally, The William H. Hannon Foundation made a sizeable grant to The Association of Catholic Student Councils (TACSC). Since its founding in 1982, TACSC has been at the forefront of Catholic education leadership, providing conferences and training programs year-round. The William H. Foundation has been supporting TACSC since 2001, and has been a part of the dramatic growth of the organization.
